

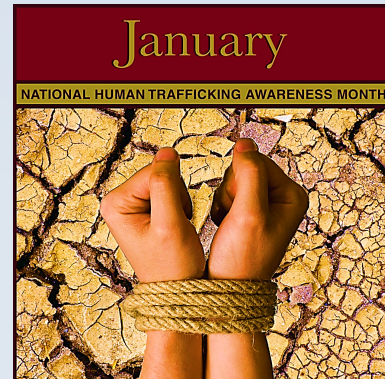

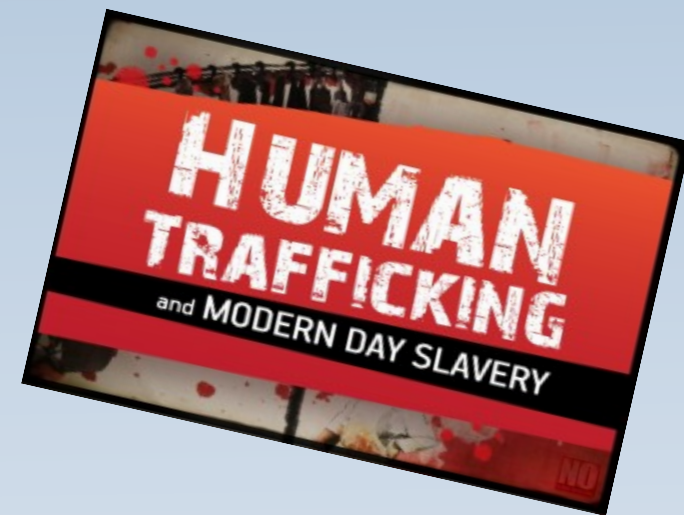

Defining Human Trafficking

Trafficking in persons -the **recruitment, transportation, transfer, harboring or receipt of persons, by means of the threat or use of force, fraud, coercion, abuse of power** for the purpose of **exploitation.**

(UN Protocol on Trafficking, 2000)

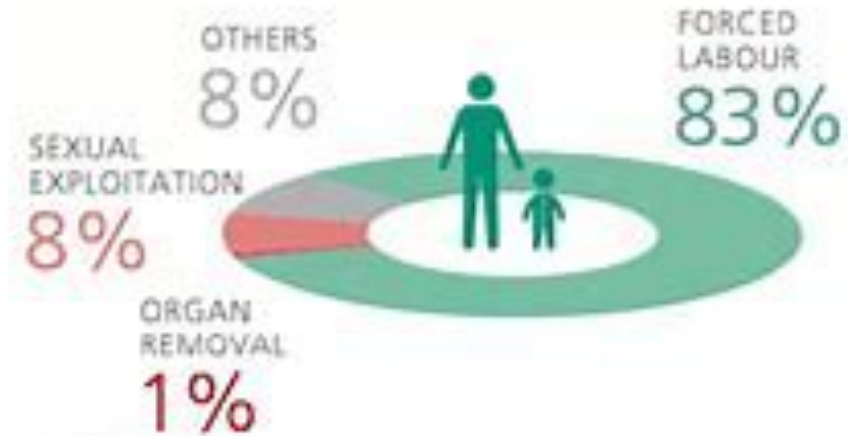
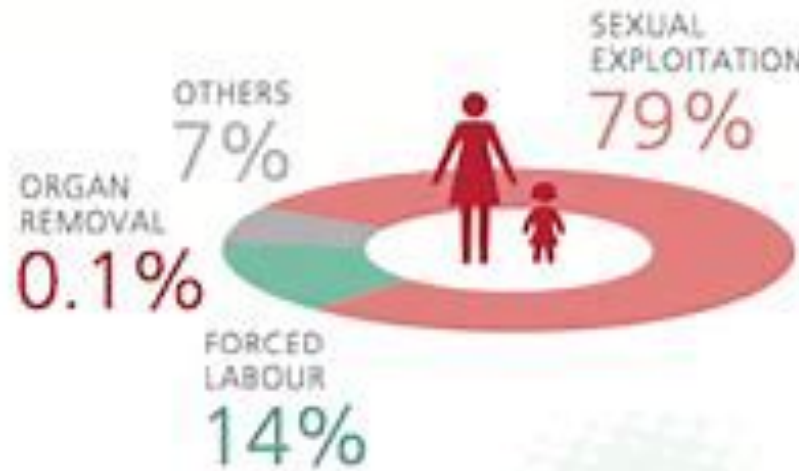

Human trafficking can include, but does not require, movement

People can be considered trafficking victims regardless of whether they:

- Born into state of servitude
- Transported to the exploitative situation
- Previously consented to work for a trafficker
- Participated in a crime as direct result of being trafficked

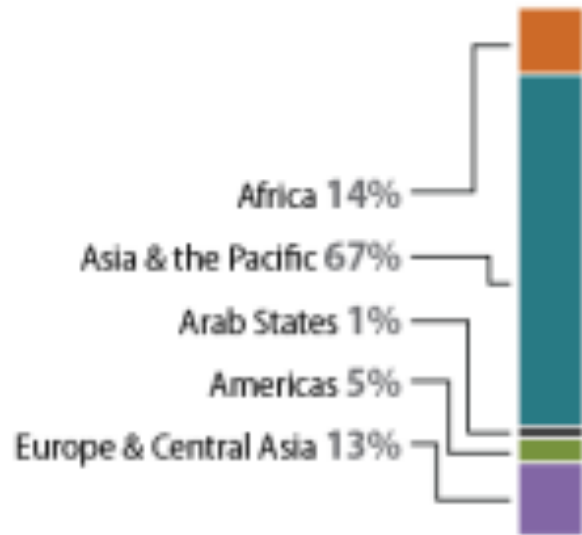

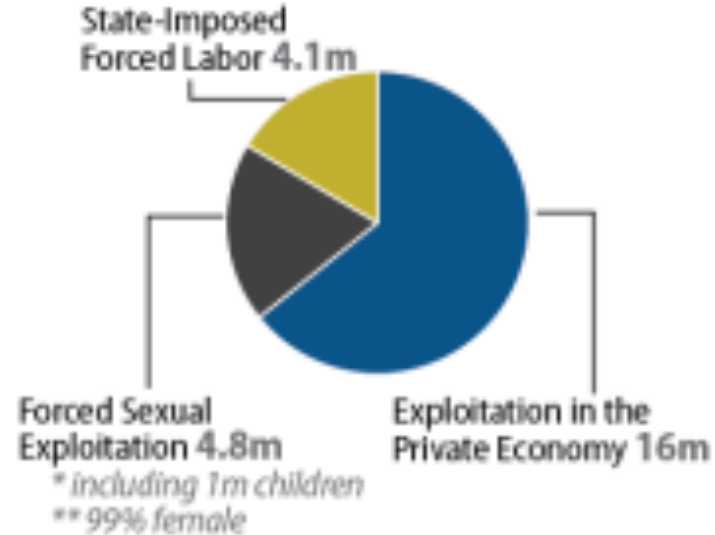

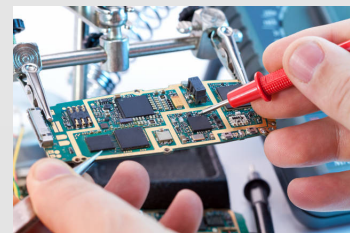
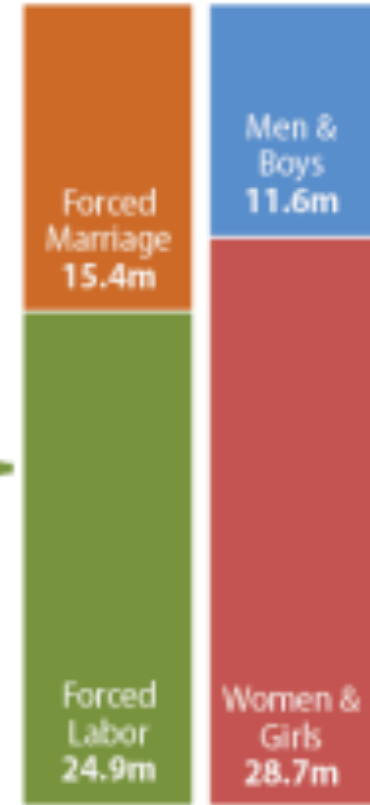
BY GEOGRAPHIC DISTRIBUTION

According to UNICEF & ILO - Estimated 168 million children aged 5 - 17 involved in child labor. 85 million are engaged in what the ILO deems "hazardous work".

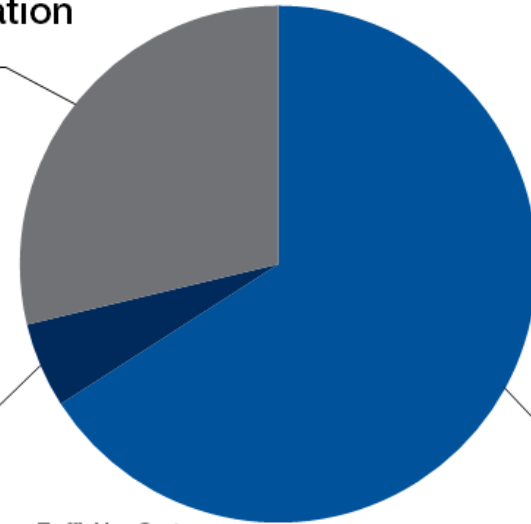

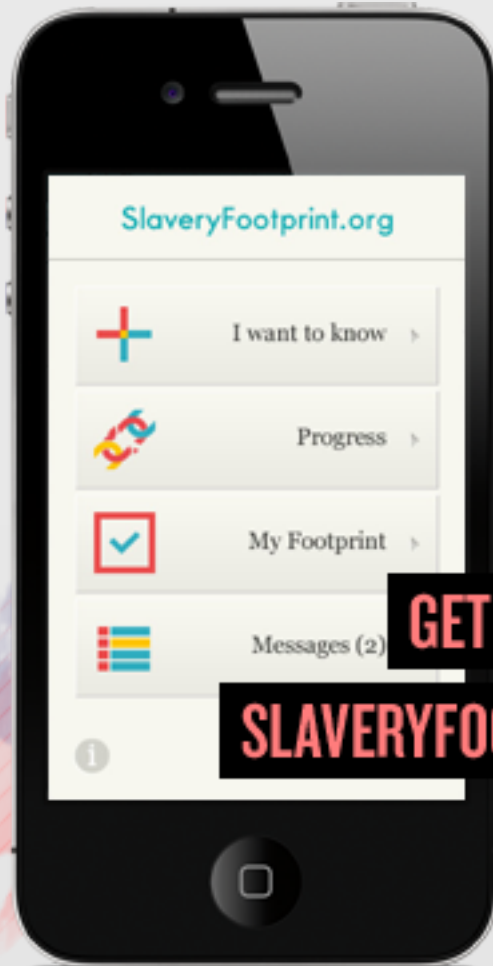

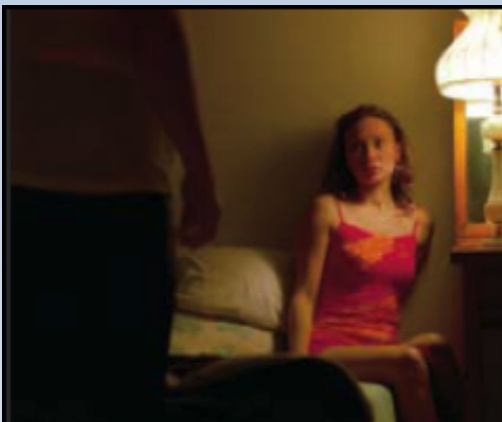
